How do I get a prescription?

Veterinarians can only write prescriptions when a valid **veterinarian-client-patient-relationship** (VCPR) exists.

Once your VCPR has been established, your veterinarian must determine the medical need for each prescription, document it in the medical record, and be available for follow-up.

What is a VCPR, and how do I know if I have one?

A valid VCPR exists when the following criteria are met:

RESPONSIBILITY: The veterinarian has assumed responsibility for making clinical assessments and recommendations for the health of the animals, and the client has agreed to the veterinarian assuming this responsibility.

KNOWLEDGE: The veterinarian has sufficient knowledge of the animals on which to base the assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of the animals' medical condition.

TRUST: The client has agreed to follow the veterinarian's recommendations and prescriptions.

COMMUNICATION: The veterinarian is available or has arranged for follow-up evaluation, especially in the event of adverse reactions or failure of the treatment regimen.
